Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP)

As we seek reaffirmation of our accreditation, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) says in **Core Requirement 2.12**:

The institution has developed an acceptable Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) that includes an institutional assessment and focuses on learning outcomes and/or the environment supporting student learning and accomplishing the mission of the institution.

Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP)

The SACSCOC also states in **Comprehensive Standard 3.3.2** that: The institution has developed a Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) that:

- Demonstrates institutional capability for the initiation, implementation, and completion of the QEP.
- Includes broad-based involvement of institutional constituencies in the development and proposed implementation.
- Identifies goals and a plan to assess achievement.

El Centro's Working Definition

Critical Thinking is a disciplined and continuous process of asking the right questions and practicing logical thought processes to come to justifiable conclusions.

Why Critical Thinking?

- Data shows that El Centro students have difficulty transitioning into a learning environment where analysis and problem solving are necessary for academic success.
- New core objectives from the THECB that go into effect in Fall 2014 include critical thinking skills ← our QEP topic!
- Critical thinking is a core objective required to be incorporated within all core courses.
- Critical thinking is consistently noted as a highly ranked skill and emerging need from employers.

Do we have Learning Outcomes?

Yes! Our plan is designed to improve students' abilities to :

- 1. Ask pertinent questions that clarify and focus an issue.
- 2. Identify critical thinking terminology and processes.
- 3. Evaluate quality, quantity and relevance of information.
- 4. Formulate well reasoned conclusions and solutions.
- 5. Implement continuous improvement in thought processes, through reflection.
